UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

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The B.S. degree in Justice Studies is designed for students interested in social inquiry in the areas of justice, law and social change. Students pursue careers in the areas of law and society, civil and human rights, economic justice, environmental protection, hunger and homelessness, immigration, peace and justice, public policy, law enforcement, probation or victim advocacy. Other students pursue advanced degrees in law or graduate school. Our interdisciplinary program allows students the flexibility to pursue the broader subject of justice or concentrate their studies in one of five areas:

- Citizenship, migration and human rights
- Globalization, sustainability and economic justice
- Law, policy and social change
- Media, technology and culture
- Social identities and communities

Bachelor of Science, Justice Studies

Advising: Our advisors are available to meet with students at least once each semester to answer questions about our Justice Studies program and help students plan their programs of study. Advisors also provide counseling to students about additional programs available to students excelling in their classes or being challenged by their classes and in need of extra support. Students may call 480-965-7682 to make an appointment.

Justice Studies undergraduates must complete requirements of 1) First Year Composition and the University General Studies, 2) The College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, and 3) the Justice Studies major, and 4) any Electives, if needed. An ASU bachelors' degree requires 120 semester hours including a minimum of 45 hours of upper division (300-400 level) hours. Students may use a maximum of 64 semester hours transferred from two-year institutions. The transferability of hours will be determined by Undergraduate Admissions, while the applicability of accepted hours will be determined by the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences and Justice Studies. Students must complete a minimum of 30 semester hours at ASU.

UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

First Year Composition

Students must demonstrate reasonable proficiency in written English by achieving a grade of "C" or better in ENG 101 and 102 or in ENG 105 or their equivalents. Should a student receive a grade lower than "C" in any of the courses, it must be repeated until the specified proficiency is demonstrated.

General Studies

General Studies requirements include the following (semester hours):

- L - literacy and critical inquiry (6 hrs - 3 lower division, 3 upper division);
- MA & CS - mathematical studies (6 hrs - 3 hrs MA, 3 hrs CS);
- HU - humanities and fine arts (6 hrs lower or upper division);
- SB - social and behavioral sciences (6 hrs lower or upper division);
- HU or SB upper division – (3 hrs upper division); and
- SQ (4 hrs lecture & lab) & SQ or SG (4 hrs lecture & lab) – natural sciences.

The three awareness areas promote appreciation of cultural diversity within the contemporary United States, develop an international perspective, and foster an understanding of current human events through study of the past. These awareness area requirements can be combined with general studies requirements.

- cultural diversity in the United States - C;
- global awareness - G; and
- historical awareness - H.

COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the university General Studies requirements, the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences requires a minimum grade of "C" in MA and two Science and Society courses (3 hrs lower division, 3 hrs upper division) for a B.S. degree. These courses MAY NOT be used to fill University General Studies (except for "L, C, G or H"), but one course may double-dip with Justice Studies requirements and can be chosen from the list of approved Science and Society courses. JUSTICE STUDIES REQUIREMENTS

The major in Justice Studies consists of 45 semester hours; the requirements are **3 hours in a writing course, 30 hours in Justice Studies** (6 may be transfer hours and 24 from Justice Studies - JUS), and **12 hours in a related field or discipline specific focus** approved by the School's advisement staff. **Only grades of "C" or better will meet degree requirements for Justice Studies requirements.** Students who earn a "D" in a non-required JUS course may apply the credit toward the Elective section of the curriculum. There is a

general expectation that as the numbering scheme of the Justice Studies courses increases (100, 200, 300, 400), there is a concomitant increase in rigor, critical thinking exercises, and practical or oral and written communication skills.

Core Courses - 12 semester hours – To earn J-1 Core Status – Milestone 1.

- JUS 105* - Introduction to Justice Studies (SB) (3 hrs) or JUS 305** - Principles of Justice Studies (SB) (3 hrs);
- JUS 301 - Research in Justice Studies or equivalent (SB) (3 hrs);
- JUS 302 - Basic Statistical Analysis in Justice Studies or equivalent (CS) (3 hrs); and
- JUS 303 - Justice Theory (3 hrs).

Milestone 1: J-1 Status: Prior to enrolling in J-1 Core Status 300 level courses: complete JUS 105 or 305, 301, 302, 303 with a minimum grade of “C”.

Courses used for the Related Field or Discipline Specific Focus cannot be double-counted with the major(JUS) or University General Studies requirements. However, to encourage students to pursue a minor, concentration, certificate or concurrent major, students will be allowed to double-count the Related Field or Discipline Specific Focus courses with a minor, concentration or concurrent major.

ELECTIVES - (semester hours needed to complete the minimum graduation requirements of 120 total semester hours and 45 upper division semester hours)

The School encourages students to take advantage of the unique opportunities afforded by the University to develop personal and educational interests, whether in several disciplines, or by the deeper probing of a single field.

INTERNSHIPS - The foundation of the School of Justice & Social Inquiry Internship Program is the students' integration of classroom learning and real world experience. Interns may earn 3 or 6 hours of academic, non-graded credit through their placements.
